If this has been identified as a development point, you can support your child by asking them to explain the booklet to you or asking them targeted questions from it yourself.</li> <li>"Evaluate" relates to the ability to critique the knowledge to show why it may/may not be useful. There are sections in the booklets which explicitly state evaluation points. Your child should understand what you mean if you simply ask them to "evaluate the information in this booklet"</li> <li>Additionally, you may wish to encourage your child to complete revision materials on the relevant content (mind maps, flashcards, revision notes, etc.) and/or plan or write an essay on the material (which can be found at the back of each booklet).</li> <li>Your child should be able to identify the relevant booklet which corresponds with each core knowledge statement. However, they are welcome to ask their teacher if they are unsure.</li> </ul>
