Explain the relationship between the Executive and the other branches of government. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Encourage students review and revise content frequently. ● Ask students about their 'weekly reviews'. ● Ask students about their targets from the learning conversations with their teachers. ● Ask about upcoming assessments and homework that has been set and encourage them to contact their teacher if there is an issue. ● Discuss issues in the news and how it links to their course/wider political view. ● Encourage students to read. It could be non-fiction, political works, newspapers, or online material, but then ask them to assess it as a source using their skills. ● Suggest ways to discover wider reading online or through visits to the school library, the library and/or record offices. ● Visit political sites/museums/online displays.
