The objectives for each booklet have been divided into three distinct skills: "outline and explain" the law from within that booklet, "apply" the law to fictional legal scenarios and "evaluate" that area of law. "Outline and explain" relates to simple knowledge recall. If this has been identified as a development point, you can support your child by asking them to explain the booklet to you or asking them targeted questions from it yourself. It is important to note that they mus be able to give supporting key cases to illustrate the points they're making (all of which are clearly indicated in the booklets) "Apply" relates to the ability to attach the law to fictional legal scenarios. This cannot really be developed outside of lesson time. If this has been identified as a weakness, students are encouraged to plan and write additional essays which can be provided by teachers. Students are able to use ChatGPT to create additional legal scenarios for them to practice on (by asking "create a legal scenario relating to insert area of law here for an A-Level law student" "Evaluate" relates to the ability to critique the area of law in order to show why it may/may not be fair/effective/in need of reform. There are sections in the booklets which explicitly state
