



Uniform Policy

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1. Introduction

The government guidance entitled 'Guidance School Uniforms' November 2021, updated July 2026, that incorporates the Education Act 2021 Guidance about Costs of School Uniforms, is intended to support the development and implementation of a school uniform policy which is sensitive to the needs of the whole community. Schools should act fairly and reasonably, bearing in mind their duties under the Human Rights Act 1998 and equality and anti-discrimination legislation, which are explained within this document.

It has always been our school policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. It is our belief that a school uniform plays a valuable role in contributing to the school ethos and setting an appropriate tone.

This document is supported by the Uniform Guide that features further support and detailed examples of acceptable and unacceptable uniform items.

2. Aims

Our policy is based on the notion that school uniform:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school in line with our ethos;
- Engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school;
- Supports positive behaviour and discipline;
- Is practical, comfortable and smart;
- Identifies the children with the school and encourages identity with the school;
- Makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance and helps nurture
- cohesion between different groups of pupils;
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and good value for money by most parents.

3. Cost and value for money

The 2021 Department for Education guidance states that the highest priority should be given to ensure the cost of school uniform is reasonable and secures the best value for money. The school regularly compares uniform costs with those of other schools to ensure overall costs are in line with similar schools. In line with the DfE guidance, the school will run regular tendering competitions (at least every five years) where more than one supplier can compete for the contract and where best value for parents is secured.

The school keeps branded items to a minimum. A number of optional items of uniform are included to support an element of choice and the PE uniform in particular includes the option to choose to purchase logoed items or non logoed items, as preferred. Alternative non-branded PE items must be plain black. Trousers, shirts,



shoes, socks, coats and bags are all generic and can therefore be purchased from a range of high street stores.

The schools compulsory branded items:

- School house tie
- School logo blazer
- School logo jumper (optional item but must be the school logo item if worn)
- School logo Skirt or trousers (trousers are not logoed)

4. Provision of second-hand uniforms

Second hand school uniforms are available for parents to acquire at Acorns in Tamworth. Parents are encouraged to donate second hand uniforms when their children leave the school or outgrow school uniform, to support members of the school community. Items can be dropped off directly at Acorns or at the school.

5. Human Rights, Equality and Discrimination

The school recognises that some religions and beliefs require their adherents to conform to a particular dress code, or to otherwise outwardly manifest their belief. This could include wearing or carrying specific religious artefacts, not cutting their hair, dressing modestly or covering their head. Students have the right to manifest a religion or belief but not necessarily at all times, in all places or in a particular manner.

Where the school has a good reason for restricting such freedoms, for example, a genuine health and safety or security considerations, the restriction of an individual's rights to manifest their religion or belief may be justified. In these cases, the Headteacher will balance the rights of the individual student against the best interests of the school community as a whole. Nevertheless, the school will engage in consultation and dialogue, to accommodate religious requirements, wherever possible.

Reasonable adjustments will be made, as appropriate, for pupils with a disability.

This policy has been carefully formulated to ensure that uniform is no more costly for either gender. There is no requirement for either boys or girls to wear gender specific uniform.

6. The Uniform

- Burgundy school blazer, with school badge.
- Non logoed Plain black trousers (not black jeans, leggings, skin-tight trousers, hipsters, flared trousers, cords or combat trousers).



- Plain white blouse or shirt. Coloured T-shirts should not be visible underneath them.
- House tie.
- Student Lanyard.
- Logoed Plain black school skirt with school badge supplied only by our uniform provider, which is currently Anglia Sports and Schoolwear (a link can be found on The Polesworth School website.)
- Optional black tailored school shorts. Examples of school permitted shorts are available on the Anglia Sports and Schoolwear website (a link can be found on The Polesworth School website), however other suppliers are available. No other styles of shorts or colours are permitted. PE shorts are not a replacement for optional tailored shorts and must not be worn outside of PE lessons. Socks must be black with no logos.
- Optional plain knit black v-neck pullover with school badge supplied only by our approved uniform provider. Cardigans/hoodies are not permitted as an alternative.
- An outdoor coat or jacket. (Not a sweatshirt, hoodie or track suit top. Any jacket must have full length opening.)
- White or black ankle socks or plain black tights (no knee-high socks or knee-high tights).
- Plain all black shoes or all black polishable leather/leather effect trainers - not boots. Boots may be worn **only** if the weather is particularly bad and, on these occasions, trousers must not be tucked into the boots.
- All black polishable shoes or all black leather/leather effect trainers must be of a smart, practical and appropriate for the school site.
- All black polishable shoes or all black leather/leather effect trainers must not display logos or laces in any other colour than black.

7. P.E Kit

- Black polo shirt with school logo or plain black alternative.
- Black shorts with school logo or plain black shorts, leggings or cycle shorts. Plain black shorts, leggings or cycle shorts must not display non-school logos in any other colour than black.
- Shorts or cycle shorts must be a minimum length of 7-inches.
- $\frac{3}{4}$ black zip training top, school rugby shirt or plain black alternative. The optional $\frac{3}{4}$ black zip and rugby top are available for purchase from the school shop.
- Black football socks with school logo or plain black football socks for winter sports.
- White or Black crew socks for SUMMER or INDOOR sports.
- Sports trainer – suitable cushioning and soles.
- Football boots, shinpads and gum shields – when on relevant activity.
- Suitable bag to carry kit.



Note – if your child is wearing the $\frac{3}{4}$ plain black zip top they must have a plain black polo shirt underneath for lessons.

8. P.E Kit (optional)

- Plain black base layers
- Gloves for winter
- Woolly hat for winter
- Plastic bag for any wet clothing and a towel

9. Jewellery and Make-up

- Jewellery should be minimal. Only ONE pair of small stud earrings is allowed. Rings should be limited to one ring on each hand. Bracelets and bangles are not permitted.
- Nose studs and other facial piercings are NOT permitted and no other visible body piercings are allowed.
- There should be no visible body art.
- Fashion belts/brightly coloured belts are not permitted.
- We do not allow extremes of hairstyle, hair colour or hair accessories. Hair should not be closely shaved, patterned or multi coloured. Only natural hair colours are permitted.
- Make up must not be extreme.
- No false or excessively long nails. Only natural shades of nail polish may be worn.

The school receives pupil premium funding that may be used to subsidise the purchase of compulsory school uniform. Requests should be put in writing and addressed to the Headteacher.

The Headteacher reserves the right to decide what is acceptable in light of the school's standards and what is appropriate for a busy working community.

10. The Role of Parents

We expect all parents to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily schoolwork. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has the correct uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair.

We understand that a minority of students push at the boundaries of uniform



acceptability and parents can sometimes be left feeling somewhat unsure about the uniform required. This policy serves to clarify for parents the exact requirements that we expect from all students. Parents should be aware that at The Polesworth School it is common practice for all staff to challenge students who are not in full school uniform. Any student out of uniform is therefore likely to be questioned about this throughout the day.

It is important that each item of clothing is labelled with the child's name as this avoids problems of clothing getting mixed up, particularly in PE changing rooms. Clear labelling means that if an item of uniform is mislaid it can be identified and returned quickly

11. The Role of Governors

The Governors support the Headteacher in implementing the school uniform policy. They consider all representations from parents regarding the policy and liaise with the Headteacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and sensitively. It is the Governors' responsibility to ensure that the school uniform meets all regulations concerning equal opportunities. Governors ensure that the school uniform policy helps children to dress sensibly in clothing that is hardwearing, safe and practical.

The governing board will ensure a written contract is in place with the supplier of any branded items.

12. Failure to Wear Acceptable Uniform to School

If a student fails to wear acceptable uniform to school, they will be sent to Student Services where items of uniform, where available, will be provided for them to wear temporarily. Incorrect items of uniform, such as hoodies, trainers and excessive or disallowed jewellery, will be confiscated. Students will be advised to collect confiscated uniform items from Student Services at the end of the school day.

In accordance with our Behaviour and Discipline Policy, breaches of the school uniform policy will result in sanctions, including loss of social times and/or detention.
